The predicted grade to Post-16 centres is not adjusted in light of later assessments.

Maths and English for Full Time Students

- > Students who achieve grade 3 or below in English and/or maths will need to continue working towards their GCSE.
- > Those with grade 3 need to retake GCSE.
- > Those with 2 and below can take qualifications that lead to GCSE or take GCSE.
- Students at CRC will retake GCSE English and/or maths if they have achieved a grade 2 or 3
- > Students with learning difficulties and/or disabilities, may be exempt from the above, but will be required to study maths and/or English

T Levels – what are they?

Technical levels are new qualifications, examined nationally for the first time in 2022

They are:

- Equivalent to 3 'A' Level qualifications
- > Directly linked to future employment through higher apprenticeships or straight into employment
- More hands on than academic qualifications

They consist of:

- Scenario based teaching
- ➤ 3 months of work placement
- Learning employability skills (specific and general)
- Different assessment styles (not just exam based)

Colleges delivering T levels this year in Cambridgeshire are:

Cambridge Regional College and Cambridge Academy for Science and Technology.

- Using the search facility at www.mychoice16.co.uk pupils can begin to find courses that they would like to do and the Post-16 centres that they would like to go to.
- Look at the eligibility for those courses at particular centres.
 What grades need to be achieved to be offered a place on the course? Are you currently on track to achieve these grades?
- Look at what different types of courses mean? What is the difference between a Diploma, a Certificate and an Extended Certificate?





Key Information

- All applications within County are made using MyChoice16
- All Year 11 pupils have dedicated IAG lessons during the PSHE curriculum to help complete the process
- Pupils should have made all applications prior to the Christmas break
- All applications are checked by SVC staff before being released
- Pupils should make multiple applications
- Pupils should hold multiple offers





Priorities For Pupils

- Use the Training Day to kick-start Mock Revision (7th October). Teachers will give advice on how to revise and the pupil drive contains many resources for all subjects.
- Complete personal statements for Post-16 applications homework deadline 17th October.
- Use IAG lesson time efficiently to ensure mychoice16 profiles are up to date and that potential courses have been fully explored.
- Check that pupils are eligible for the centres and courses for which they wish to apply.
