Can you give a summary of who you are and when you studied at Sawston.

I am Jo Hindley and I studied at Sawston 1976-1981.

What was your favourite subject at school and why?

I particularly enjoyed French when I was taught by Mrs Marven. She communicated a real love of the language.

#### What is your best memory of being a pupil at Sawston?

My best memories are of singing with the Madrigal Group conducted by Janet Macleod, or 'Mrs Mac' as we knew her. We would rehearse in the beautiful Walnut Room. It was such a privilege to be allowed in there. Mrs Mac invited me to join the Madrigal Group when it was first set up. We referred to ourselves as the 'Mad Wrigglers'! We competed in the Cambridge Festival and won the Silver Rose Bowl.

I also loved playing the percussion for the Sawston Light Opera Group. I once had a very important solo playing the triangle!

# What do you think you gained from having been a pupil at Sawston?

I was stretched academically and I was part of 'whole community' education for life.

#### What route did you follow to your current role?

I now work as a home birth midwife in inner city Birmingham. I did a three year diploma (it is now a degree course) in Midwifery 1990-1993 which qualified me as a midwife so I have been a midwife for 26 years. I have even been midwife for women whose own births I attended as midwife! Prior to becoming a midwife I did a first degree in Human Sciences at Balliol College, Oxford University, and in 2005 I completed a Masters degree in midwifery.

#### What is a typical day at work like for you?

I work flexibly depending on what is happening and what our home birth service requires. I visit women at different stages of their pregnancy to assess if they and their growing baby are well and to help them prepare for giving birth and looking after their newborn, and I visit women who have recently given birth to help them as they adjust after the birth. I have a particular role in helping mothers to successfully breastfeed their babies.

And I am on call for births. If a woman is in labour and is

planning a home birth, I go to her with my midwifery kit and look after her until she has safely given birth. Very often women have water births at home in a hired birth pool.

## What advice would you give to any current pupils who are interested in a career in midwifery?

Read and research about 'normal' physiological birth. It is wonderfully inspiring to appreciate how babies can be born safely, calmly and naturally without the need for doctors, interventions or going to hospital.

#### What involvement have you had with the school since you left?

Very little as I live in Birmingham now, so I have been interested to reconnect via social media. I was very upset to hear about the fire burning down the Walnut Room.

### What are your plans for the future?

I work in an area of Birmingham rich in ethnic and social diversity so I meet people with cultural roots from all over the world every day. I love this aspect of my work and I want to build on it to strengthen relationships within my local community, particularly around birth choices and parenting, but also addressing issues to do





with the Climate Emergency that is affecting us all but some more than others.
