Their return to College has proved they have an impressive capacity for resilience; it has been a delight to welcome them back and resume near normal school life. Over the

It is our collective hope that in the year to come, we can return even stronger, working together in a vibrant College where all individuals are valued and treated with the respect they deserve. ### **New Topics in History for Years 7 and 8**

It has been a very exciting return for both teachers and pupils in History. As our wider aim this year in the History department is to start to improve the diversity of the curriculum, we are teaching some new topics for the first time this year: in both Year 7 and 8 we have introduced new enquiries.

Year 7s are now studying what the fascinating story of Eleanor of Aquitaine can reveal about the High Middle Ages (part of the medieval era). Pupils are learning about what her life can tell us in particular about power and gender – and how one woman could

challenge accepted ideas of what it meant to be a woman. Year 8s are learning about the experiences of both native peoples and colonisers in a new unit on the development of the Early British Empire. We hope to use this unit to show pupils how the ideas of race were constructed to justify slavery, but also to show how native people showed great determination in resisting their oppressors in a wide range of countries: America, Ireland, Barbados and India.

#### **Interactive resources in Maths**


