not biodegrade, the STEM club set to work creating plastics out of potatoes and milk! First came plastic made from potatoes, which involved a lot of grating, soaking and decanting!

From this the pupils made an array of coloured plastic films! In the next week, STEM club created harder plastic from the polymers within milk. Our cycle of Teaching and Learning Briefings continues. Teaching and Learning Briefings are a series of mini training sessions on a theme running throughout the year. This year we are looking at how we can develop our teaching. of reading across the curriculum, using evidence-based teaching strategies from the influential US educationalist, Barack Rosenshine. The most recent focus has been on teachers' use of questioning, which can be used both to check for pupils' understanding and to develop pupils' understanding. The precise wording of questions can make a big difference, and asking a series of questions, with follow-up questions responsive to what pupils say, can help to support and extend pupils' learning.
