### **REMINDER** Letter from the LA about winter illnesses.

Earlier today, we sent out a letter from the Local Authority Director of Public Health regarding advice Covid 19, influenza and diarrhoea and vomiting. The salient points are:

- The symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not
  possible to tell if your child has COVID-19, flu or another respiratory infection based
  on symptoms alone.
- Children who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and where possible avoid contact with other people. They can go return to College when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.
- If a child has a positive COVID-19 test result they should stay at home and where possible avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day they took the test.
- Secondary school children will be offered influenza vaccination as far as it is possible
  to do so, with primary schools and lower years 7, 8 and 9 prioritised, and older ages
  offered vaccination once an offer has been made to younger children and subject to
  vaccine availability. All children aged 2-17 years with long-term health conditions will
  be offered the flu vaccine.
- Good hand hygiene is important to stop the spread of the diarrhoea and vomiting virus. It is important to understand that alcohol gels, whilst effective for COVID-19 do not kill viruses which cause D&V and people are advised to wash their hands thoroughly using soap and water and dry them after using the toilet, before preparing food and eating.
- If your child has had symptoms of diarrhoea and/or vomiting, they should not return to College until they have been symptom-free for at least 48 hours.
