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
Update from English



STEM Clubs busy in Science

The Junior and Senior STEM clubs have had a busy term launching two different projects that are both based around Raspberry Pis. The first is our now regular participation in the Hills Road Robocon competition to design and build an autonomous robot. Our second project is an entry into a competition run by PA Consulting to develop a product that helps improve personal health and wellbeing. Our Senior STEM team aims to develop a personal, portable air quality monitor that people with asthma or other breathing difficulties could carry around to monitor their environment. We've teamed up with the Computer Science department at school and it will be exciting to see how these projects develop over the next term.

Finally we now have a group of Y9 Science Ambassadors, who are working out how to lead this new programme. Their ideas so far include organising visits to share their enthusiasm for Science with local primary schools, and raising funds to allow us to carry out more dissections. This will give budding future biologists and surgeons an opportunity to try a greater range of dissections than we would normally have opportunity to do in lessons.
