From the Principal

We were delighted to be able to share the site regeneration plans proposed under the DfE's School Rebuilding Project at our recent launch. It was three years ago this month that we were named in the first fifty schools to benefit from the scheme but it has clearly taken many steps to reach this final stage before submission to the

planners. In all of the conversations and development of the plans, we have been mindful of four key drivers: providing the best possible curriculum space for our pupils now and in the future; improving the safety of our young people and community users; achieving net zero carbon in operation; and, significantly, staying true to the original vision and values of Henry Morris.

The latter includes ensuring that the campus itself is a 'silent teacher' inspiring and facilitating learning, with courtyards and open spaces in which pupils can thrive. All involved closely in the project are committed to achieving a design that complements the beauty of the original buildings and works in harmony with the culture and ethos of the College. As important, has been securing the future of the site for the use of our community, both through

creating a vibrant learning space for our future generation of village children and in enabling community events, clubs and groups to make full use of improved facilities. The Marven Centre serves a unique function in the College and deserves this investment to secure its future; a new performance space with enhanced seating, improved access and, hopefully, recovered heritage features such as the original gilded ceiling, will breathe fresh life into this much loved building. Something the College alone could never have achieved.

We are hopeful that, with the support of our community and parents, the site plans can be realised and that work on this two-year construction project will start by the end of the year. Whilst we will need to plan carefully the logistics of such a large scale build so as not to impact on pupils' learning and opportunities, the College will continue to deliver the same curriculum and co-curricular programme during and after the work is done. This is an exciting chapter in our history and one which we believe will honour the memory of Henry Morris and strengthen the concept of Village College education.
