


young people an opportunity to showcase their talents on stage to an appreciative audience. The work of our instrumental teachers and our music teachers is outstanding.

Geography Update

This half term saw our Year 11 Geographers completing their fieldwork for their Geographical Application exam in the summer. Pupils conducted two enquiries on our trip to Hunstanton. Firstly, pupils investigated the effectiveness of coastal management by completing Environmental Quality Surveys of the groynes and sea wall. They then measured the exposure of the groynes on the beach to see whether they had been effectively trapping sediment from longshore drift. Pupils then turned their attention to tourism in the town and the impacts that it has - positive and negative conducting questionnaires with the public and a land use survey. Year 9 Carpentry Module in DT

The focus of this Year 9 project is predominantly on practical skills. Pupils have been investigating jointing methods and softwood.
