
Introducing the new Forum Co-Chairs

Green Schools Project - Travel Focus

Junior Maths Challenge

Dr Tunna, Maths Teacher, writes: Pupils in year 7 and 8 recently took part in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. Participating in a UKMT Maths Challenge is an exhilarating and fun maths experience that pushes the problem-solving skills of pupils in a uniquely enjoyable way. Each carefully designed question is meant to be accessible yet intriguing, requiring clever insights rather than just rote memorisation. The 60-minute time limit adds a thrilling edge, forcing you to think quickly and strategically, deciding when to persist with a tricky puzzle or move on to the next question. The problems often feel more like captivating puzzles than standard test questions, covering diverse areas like logic, geometry, and number theory in creative ways. It is challenging for everyone, even the most able pupils. Many pupils did very well getting gold, silver and bronze certificates. There was a real sense of achievement for the pupils, highlighting how fun and creative mathematics can be at its heart.




BUSY PUPILS in **ACTIVITIES WEEK**



Humbling!!


What's your favourite part of your job?

How are the medal tables calculated?

How are the point tables calculated?

Each position in the standings is worth points (see table →)

If you were competing in a team event, these points are multiplied by the number of players in your team.

E.g. If your Netball team came 3rd with 10 players: 3rd place = 6 point x 10 players = 60 points for your house.

Therefore the house who tops the overall points table CAN be different to the house who tops the medals table.




