Work on site regeneration continues apace. Whilst it has taken some time to adjust to the new set-up, staff and pupils have settled in well to the new normal. The compound is now fully established, and work will begin after half term to lay the foundations of the new build. The attenuation tank is finished and the area will be reseeded in the spring.

The PE department moves into their temporary changing rooms

next half term, enabling demolition of the old area to begin. The Sports Hall and Gymnasium will be closed until around Easter next year to allow for infrastructure work on the roof, heating and flooring. We will be making full use of the multi-purpose hall for the PE curriculum and hoping the winter months allow us to be outside as much as we can.

Preparation for the demolition of the disused building by the Sports Centre also starts, as does removal of the old mobile and the installation of the kiosk in its temporary position next to it. The additional social space here and on Library Court creates enough room for everybody, even when we must close the field. We aim to let pupils use the field as much as possible but the reality is that from mid-November through to February it's just

too muddy to use socially. When the field is closed, we will open the halls to give each year group a space to be warm and dry at lunchtime.

The most important aspect of all this is trying to keep disruption to the life of the College to a minimum, enabling the curriculum to run as normal and to offer as many opportunities as possible. To that end, it was lovely to finish this half term with our inaugural Year 7 Last Choir Standing in which pupils from every class competed fabulously. Aptly, class 7C2 was victorious with their rousing version of 'Seize the Day!'

# **Update from Maths**

Autumn is a great time of year to see Maths in nature. The Fibonacci sequence, a pattern where each number is the sum of the two before (0, 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21,...) appears in pinecones, sunflowers, and even the spiral arrangement of seeds in pumpkins. If you cut a pumpkin horizontally (around its "waist"), you should be able to count 13 spirals going one way and 21 going the other. Accepted, this may not be as much fun as carving a pumpkin, but why not give it a go.

As Maths teachers, we are always focused on helping pupils strengthen their mathematical reasoning - the ability to explain how and why an answer makes sense. This helps build confidence and builds deeper understanding. Parents can support at home by asking children to explain their thinking when doing homework and check they have communicated in writing all the steps they have taken to answer a question.

#### **Update from English**






