Art Update

The Art department is busy: Year 7s are working towards their Bronze Arts Award, building creativity and technical skill through hands-on arts projects. They are exploring Monument Valley and using isometric drawing to design their own mind-bending game levels. Meanwhile, Year 8s are mastering 1-point and 2-point perspective to create convincing depth in streets, buildings, and interiors, sharpening their understanding of proportion and space, while Year 9s are pushing beyond traditional spatial rules through reversed perspective and optical illusion, studying artists who use distortion and impossible structures to spark creative risk-taking and critical thinking.

At KS4, Year 10 Art are expanding their skills through dynamic workshops exploring varied drawing techniques and the construction of sculptural space, while Year 10 Photography are learning digital software and image manipulation to create professional-style magazine covers. Year 11 Art are completing their Component 1 by developing personal themes and satirical imagery to produce artworks with rich, layered meaning. Meanwhile, Year 11 Photography are stepping into the professional and applied world, creating industry-style images for movie posters, music bands, and magazine covers.
